1. TRAVEL ADVICE FOR COPENHAGEN

1.1 PUBLIC TRANSPORT IN COPENHAGEN

Copenhagen offers several forms of public transportation. Buses and the metro are available 24 hours a day, although S-buses and night buses may offer a more limited service. Trains operate from 5am – 12.30am Sunday-Thursday, and additional trains are running between 1am – 5am Friday – Sunday.

Buses and local 'S-tog' trains are not be covered in this guide, however, the below websites suggest all types of journeys, including these trains and buses:

If you would prefer a more active visit, bicycles can be rented at a daily rate from many hotels and bicycle shops, which you can find on almost every street. Alternatively, e-scooters and e-bikes can be found scattered across the city and offer pay-as-you-go schemes:

On the day of the conference, please insert the destination to arrive at the venue, Auditorium 2 at Rigshospital: **Inge Lehmanns Vej 7, 2100 København**



To get to the auditorium, you can use the entrances (highlighted by yellow cross) 2 or 44.

1.1.1 Tickets

During your stay, you will most likely only require zones 1-4 (zone 1 – city centre; 4 – airport) and can purchase tickets either physically at the ticket machines or digitally on 'Din Offentlige Transport (DOT)' – the 'DOT' app on the App Store and Google Play. To purchase physical tickets, look for a red ticket machine in the station hallways but some are also available on the platform at some stations. There are no ticket barriers when travelling on Danish public transport but ticket inspectors will come aboard regularly to check tickets (fine is 750 DKK/approx. €100).

Tickets are transferable across all modes of transportation (bus, metro, train etc.) meaning you can jump between different transportation types on your journey. Please be aware that when buying a single ticket, it is only valid for a limited time, so pay attention to the expiration stamp.

If you anticipate to be travelling a lot around Copenhagen within a 24-hour period, you can purchase a City Pass Small (from 80 DKK/approx. €10, 75; zones 1-4). City Pass tickets allow unlimited travel on buses, trains and the metro and extended periods and zones are also available. Purchase of such tickets are available on the DOT app as well as ticket vending machines on all train and metro stations.

1.1.2 Metro

1.1.2.1 From Copenhagen Airport to Rigshospital

Approx. 30 minutes. After you have walked out of arrivals in Terminal 3, continue to the end of the terminal, where you can purchase tickets at the red ticket machines on the right-hand side of the ground floor or via the 'DOT' app. From there you can take lifts or escalators up to the first floor and continue straight on until you see the metro doors.

You can take either the M1 (green) or M2 (yellow) line to Nørreport station and change to M3 (red) line to Trianglen (follow signs to the other side of the metro station). The M3 (red) line is a circular route hence you need to check the overhead board that you are travelling 'via Østerport' and depart at 'Trianglen' – there is a short 10-minute walk from the metro station to Rigshospital.

1.1.2.2 From Copenhagen Main Station (Hovedbanegården/København H) to Rigshospital

Approx. 20 minutes. There is a metro station just outside the back of Copenhagen Main Station, where 'Reventlowsgade' street meets 'Reverdilsgade' street, called 'København H'. There is a direct M3 (red) line to Trianglen that takes only 9 mins - the M3 (red) line is a circular route, therefore you must check the overhead board that you are travelling 'via Kongens Nytorv' and depart at 'Trianglen'. From there it is a short 10-minute walk from the metro station to the Rigshospital.

1.1.3 Train

1.1.3.1 From Copenhagen Airport to Copenhagen Main Station (Hovedbanegården/København H)/Nørreport/Østerport

If your hotel is located near Copenhagen's main station, it may be faster taking the one of the regional trains that stop at many of the main stations (including Nørreport and Østerport). As advised previously, after you have walked out of arrivals in Terminal 3, you can continue to the end of the terminal, you can purchase tickets at the red ticket machines on the right-hand side of the ground floor or via the 'DOT' app. All regional trains heading north will stop at København H and will depart from Platform 2 (Spor 2), which is located at the end of the terminal (right-hand side).

Estimated journey times below and be aware that the trains can be busier than the metro, depending on the season.

- To København H – est. 14 mins
- To Nørreport – est. 21 mins
- To Østerport – est. 25 mins

Close to metro stations on the M3 (red) line to get to Rigshospital.

M1 or M2 metro from Nørreport or Kongens Nytorv or may require 5-10 min taxi/20-min bus.
