“Study on monetizing privacy. An economic model for pricing personal information”

Questions & Answers

Q1:	Is it possible to extract results or data from the ENISA research project to use them for academic working papers and/or a journal publication?
A1:	All ENISA project results are by default public. In this respect, academic publications relying on results or data from this project should clearly acknowledge the ENISA project (ENISA should be notified and should agree with such publications during the period the project is running) and clear reference should be made to the final report after the project is finalized.
Q2:	The Tender specifies the deliverables to ENISA. Is it correct that this does not include a database with raw data collected from the field experiment as such a database is not specified as deliverable?
A2:	<p>All data collected during this project belong to ENISA. All personal data collected should be processed in accordance with Community Regulation (EC) No 45/2001 http://eur-lex.europa.eu/smartapi/cgi/sga_doc?smartapi!celexapi!prod!CELEXnumdoc&lg=en&numdoc=32001R0045&model=guichett of the European Parliament and of the Council (OJ L8 of 12.01.2001, p1) on the protection of individuals with regard to the processing of personal data by the Community institutions and bodies and on the free movement of such data.</p> <p>ENISA will keep for internal audit purposes such data.</p> <p>However the aggregated results are public and will be included in the deliverables.</p>

Q3:	Would it be allowed to continue the field experiment after finalization of the ENISA project with the intention to collect more information?
A3:	In case that the field experiment continues, clear notification should be given to the participants stating that the experiment is conducted further without any involvement of ENISA. In case that raw data collected during the project are further used for other research purposes, clear notification should be available, from the beginning.
Q4:	Funds that have been market in the budget for travel, may they be used for another purpose related to the project, for example, for additional funding for the experiment? Or are these funds bound to be used only for travel?
A4:	<p>The tender specification asks for the tenderer to provided a lump sum price up to EUR70,000.00 <u>to cover all tasks and deliverables</u> as outlined.</p> <p>In Part 2, Article 5 - PLACE OF EXECUTION OF THE ACTIVITIES AND COMMUNICATIONS, it mentions that <u>at least one business trip</u> shall be accounted for.</p> <p>The tenderer is otherwise free to apportion funds up to the limit in whichever way they see fit.</p>
Q5:	If I want to submit a tender for a joint research with professor X, would one of us have to be the contractor, and the other would have to be the subcontractor? Or would ENISA directly negotiate (IFF our proposal is accepted) with our two universities?
A5:	ENISA should receive one project proposal per contractor so that ENISA will sign the contract with one single entity. In case certain tasks are subcontracted, this should be clearly stated in the project proposal and indicated in the subcontracting form that has to be filled and included the documents submitted to ENISA.
Q6:	Does ENISA have rules about academic overhead costs?
A6:	See answer A4. The total amount specified in the call for project covers all the tasks and deliverables.
